The Blakehill nature reserve opened from 27th June 2005. This vast expanse of grassland reverberated to the

Il Europe. Now, the sky above vibrates to the pure notes of the skylark, and the ground beneath is a rippling carpet of wildflowers.

Cancer Research UK's Race for Life 2005 was the biggest series to date. Our target was to achieve 425,000 participants and to raise £23million. We were pretty amazed when we smashed our participation target before the end of April, and by the end of the series over half a million women had entered Race for Life, which is absolutely incredible. Our sponsorship figures are just as exciting as by the end of August we have already raised nearly £25million.

The series consisted of a staggering 170 races – some weekends saw around 15 races happening on the same day. We developed the concept of weekend races (Saturday afternoon / Sunday morning) and this year launched our "Two-in-a-Day" races (Sunday morning / Sunday afternoon), which worked particularly well. These double races are a cost effective way for us to increase our participation numbers and maximise on fundraising potential, and will be rolled out further in 2006.

The size and scale of Race for Life has changed enormously over our 12-year history, but one key feature remains unchanged – Race for Life is still delivered on the day almost entirely through the support of volunteers. Considering the numbers involved nowadays, and the number of races held each weekend between May and July, this is an incredible achievement.

The support afforded to Cancer Research UK's Race for Life from the Ladies' Circles is magnificent and hugely appreciated by the team. Our achievements are your achievement – without the input of special women from Ladies Circles up and down the country, Race for Life would be a much harder task and we are very grateful for the assistance and the friendships that have become a feature of these Races.

Our heartfelt thanks go to all the Ladies who have turned out in all weathers over the last few months to staff our administration marquees, hand out medals and water, to provide friendly advice, sell millions of pink bands and generally keep the races running like clockwork.

All relationships need to be kept fresh and the Race for Life team feel there is so much more we can do together to take our relationship forward and to develop our partnership. Watch this space! With around 220 races planned for 2006, we are raring to go and look forward to really working hard for you, and with you, on another successful series.

Belief turns dreams to reality!

Rickmansworth and Northwood, raise £75000 to build a local adventure playground.

Back in 2002, our chair at the time Maria Finn, encouraged us to look outside of the norm, she saw we had potential, to work a wee bit harder, be more imaginative and work on a large project, together. We all had small ones, and our local park was a disgrace.

We thought she was bonkers but agreed to support. We planned a 2-year campaign but only had one year to raise the money, the next two were centred on dealing with the local Council and Play Equipment companies.

In fact after we raised the initial \$50,000, our original figure - the Council insisted we raise another \$25,000 to cover the cost of them managing it, more safety flooring, insurance for the equipment - the list just went on and on. But we did it. How......

With normal Ladies Circle events, from Tin shaking to Quiz nights, Santa Collections, working with Local Roundtables – try Ferret chasing and presentations to the local Lions, Round Table and Rotary clubs who gave us £4000.

Writing heaps of letters to local companies resulted in £25,000 from Cadbury a large local company who had a budget for local activities incorporating fitness and the environment. The local park was within a local beauty spot but was falling into state of disrepair. They also committed to a 10-year rolling maintenance plan. Local developer Country Metropolitan offered £5000 - we approached them as they advertised on the roundabout, we offered them an annual advertising spot at the park instead.

Some local companies set up websites, for every hit they donated a $\mathfrak{L}1.00$. Personal donations were received as a result of newspaper coverage.



We produced T-shirts and stickers, sponsored by a local printing company that pushed forward the name of the campaign RAAP, Rickmansworth Aquadrome Adventure Playground. RAAP became a talking point amongst parents and children; it really started to gather momentum. We then started to fill in every form we could get our hands on that offered grants.

Following an initial presentation our Local Council were also recruited. The offered us $\mathfrak{L}10,000$ towards our fundraising - after two years of constant meetings this was raised to $\mathfrak{L}28,000$.


The total sum raised was £75,000. The park was opened on the 23rd July with 'Cilla' from Coronation Street.

I really think persistence got us this far. We really believed that we had the skills, and the determination (which shocked our local Council). Locally Ladies Circle has grown because we have shown people that we are not about making Jam and the likes but can be serious fundraisers, who really make a difference to our community.



Torquay Circle get ready to wrap at Christmas



Baildon Ladies Circle - Cow Splat Challenge

Within the village. there will be an element of self-help with the coconut plantation providing fibre and wood products and enabling the villagers to produce handicrafts.

The entire project is estimated at costing between £125,000 and £150,000 but will transform and save lives, creating a future out of disaster.

Sponsoring a house in this village would cost £600, so

with this in mind we hoped to make a profit of at least that amount from the evening.

The ball was held on 18th March 2005 at the Mount Hotel, Tettenhall Wood (Near Wolverhampton). Several of the guests made personal donations and several prizes were donated for the raffle.

The night was a great success, with the total raised being £650. We had achieved our aim and are now sponsoring a house in the village.
